Dear Friends!

An indispensable requirement for living in a Jesuit community is humour. This is my experience, especially now in this time of Covid-19 challenges.

At the Jesuit College in Innsbruck we currently have a nice group of Jesuits from all over the world doing their studies - please see their stories on the following pages. All of them have a great sense of humour 😊.

As Jesuit College, we are happy to give full scholarships to Jesuit students who want to focus on their doctorate. Currently, our men study theology, philosophy, biology and management.

How to proceed if a Jesuit intends to study in Innsbruck/Austria:

- A finished **master's degree** (e.g. in theology) is very helpful in order to enter directly into doctoral studies.
- Either the Provincial or the Jesuit student himself contacts the **Rector of the Jesuit College** in Innsbruck (christian.marte@jesuiten.org): first contact, first questions and answers.
- Application for admission to the **University of Innsbruck** (www.uibk.ac.at). We do this together in order to find the best possible way to get previous studies accepted.
- **Learning German** should not deter you from thinking about studying in Austria. All our students get good teachers to learn German. German opens a door not only to scientific literature, but also to an important culture in Europe. At university, the doctoral thesis can be written in English.

It is helpful to keep in mind that it usually takes **at least one year of preparation** in order to come to Innsbruck: many small steps, but it is worthwhile starting the process. Innsbruck offers high academic quality – and it is a great place to study! And: You will return home with a good network of friends and colleagues in your field.

BACK HOME

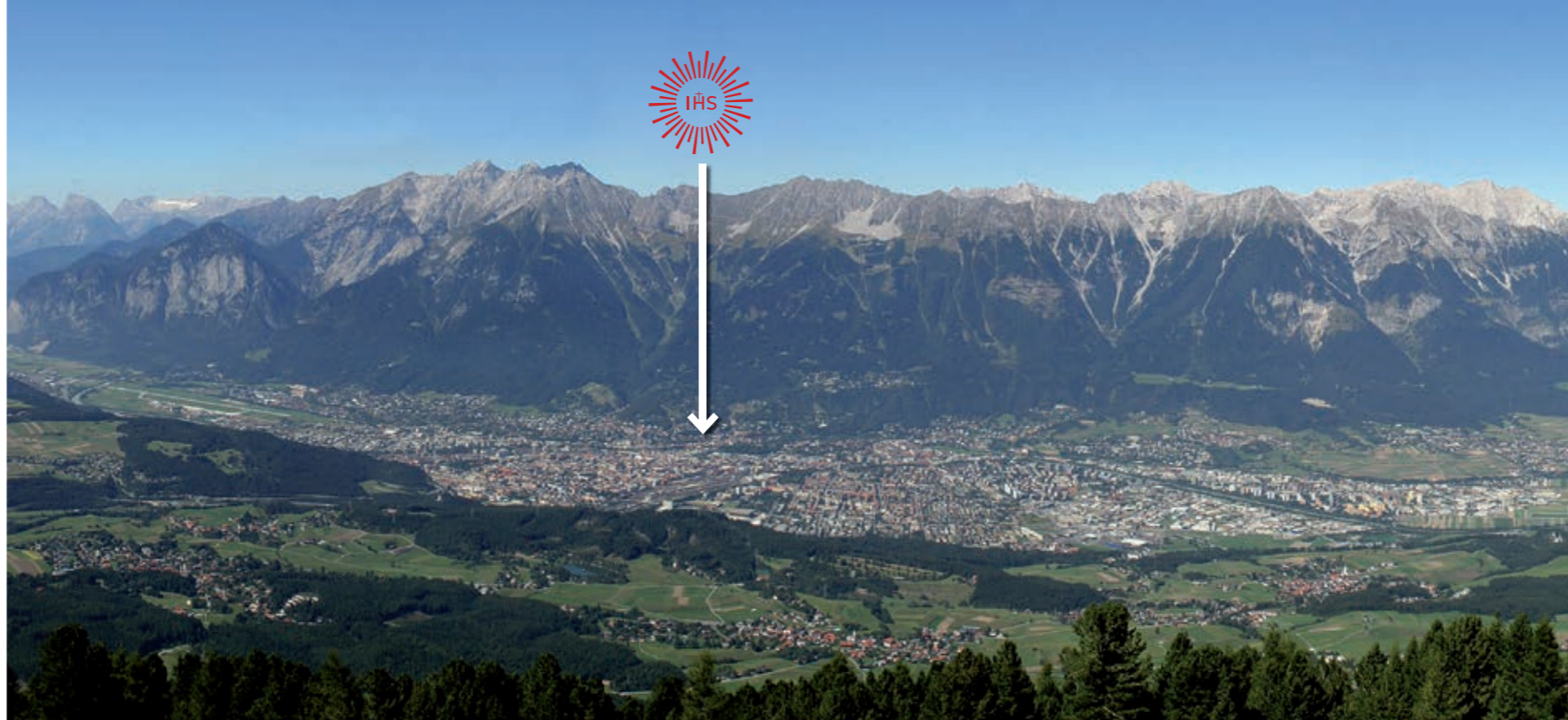


GEORGE NJERI SJ

PHILOSOPHY OF RELIGION: MASTER IN PHILOSOPHY

The Department of Philosophy at Innsbruck's Faculty of Theology is launching a new master's programme in Philosophy, "Philosophy of Religion". The starting date is autumn of 2022.

The whole course of study can be taken either online via distance-learning or in-classroom. Studied full-time, the course lasts 4 semesters over 2 years (120 ECTS points).

All classes will be conducted in English.

Our Philosophy Department has a 100+ year history as an organ of the Society of Jesus, enjoying the right to award ecclesiastical degrees. Karl Rahner SJ, Emerich Coreth SJ and Otto Muck SJ are some of the outstanding figures representing our department. The "Innsbruck School" stands for high-quality philosophical reflection on traditional topics, using the methods and tools of contemporary philosophy.

The new master's programme includes modules in metaphysics, epistemology, philosophy of language, social philosophy and ethics, discussed in light of the "big questions" in philosophy of religion.

The master's programme will provide a solid education in theoretical and practical philosophy. Graduates will be empowered to think and act as responsible and autono-

mous agents in intercultural and interreligious dialogue, equipped with a sensitivity for the plurality of worldviews in a globalized world.

All online courses will be administered according to the highest standards of quality for online teaching.

Austrian universities have a no-tuition-fee-policy for EU citizens; and we are proud to extend very affordable tuition fees to non-EU students, in accordance with the time-honoured Austrian tradition of education for all.

Graduates will receive internationally recognized M.phil. degrees and the ecclesiastical degree of Licentiate in Philosophy. The M.phil. degree in Philosophy of Religion also qualifies graduates for the PhD-programme in philosophy at our department.

NEW CANISIUS BELL



500 years ago, in 1521, Petrus Canisius was born in Nijmegen, now the Netherlands. In 1562, he founded the Innsbruck Jesuit College. Initiated by DDr. Herwig van Staa, the former governor of Tyrol, a new bell was cast by the local company Grassmayr. The new bell weighs 1808 kg and rings daily at noon. It is decorated with an image of Petrus Canisius (artist: Peter Raneburger) and the former bishop of Innsbruck Reinhold Stecher (artist: Nora Schöpfer).

NOVITIATE MOVES TO INNSBRUCK
